

BIBLE

Read “The Light of the whole world” and “The King of all kings” from *The Jesus Storybook Bible*.

Read Ephesians 3:16-21 to your child. Listen to “The Love of Christ,” by Randall Goodgame (Volume 2, Song 4) and sing along.



LITERATURE

Read *The Tale of Jemima Puddle-Duck*, by Beatrix Potter.

Read *Inch by Inch*, by Leo Lionni.

ART

Picture Study: *Road with Cypress and Star*, by Vincent van Gogh
Look closely at the painting on page 84. Discuss these questions with your child:

Do you like this painting?

What would you title this painting?

What does this painting make you think of?

MUSIC

Listen to “Introduction et marche royale du lion” (Introduction and Royal March of the Lion) on *Carnival of the Animals* (#2 on the *Children's Classics* CD). March like a king lion while you listen.

Hymn: Listen to “Trust and Obey” and sing along. The QR code and lyrics are on page 93.

HABIT

Focus on the habit of putting away toys this week.

"Let him always put away his things as a matter of course, and it is surprising how soon a habit of order is formed, which will make it pleasant to the child to put away his toys and irritating to him to see things in the wrong place" (Vol. 1, p. 130).

POETRY

Read "The Snail's Dream," by Oliver Herford on page 66 in *A Child's Book of Poems* to your child. Have your child recite the poem often throughout the week.

At the end of the week record your child reciting the poem. It will be a keepsake!

SENSORY

Collect a variety of common household objects such as books, fruit, office supplies, toys, etc. Compare two items at a time and ask your child questions to determine weight and size comparisons. If you have access to a kitchen scale, weigh each item.

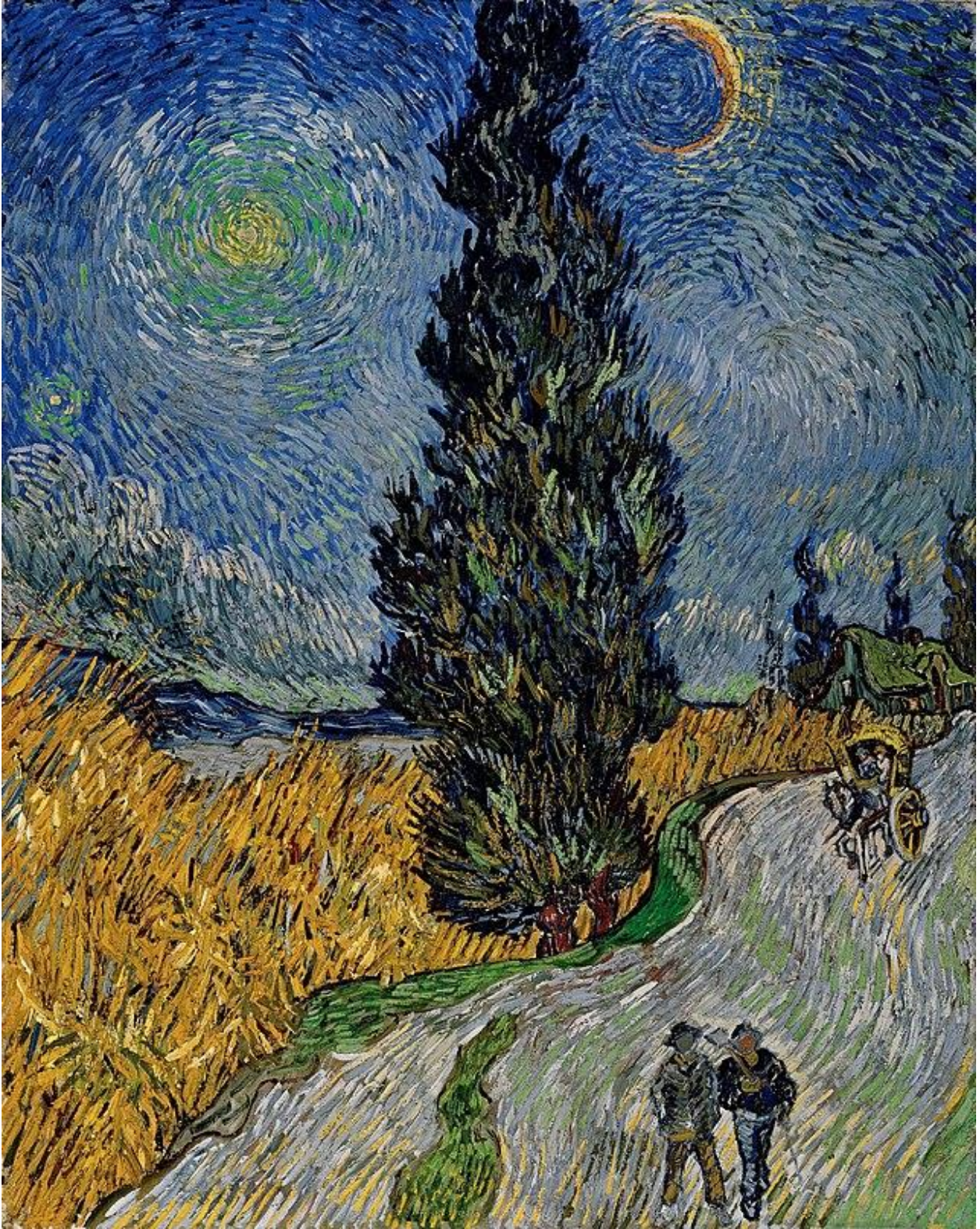

NATURE

Nature Lore: Read "How Reddy Fox Was Surprised" in *Old Mother West Wind*.

Nature Study: Go for a walk near pine trees and gather a few pinecones. Pour washable acrylic paint on a paper plate. Roll the pinecone in the paint and then roll the pinecone onto white paper. Repeat with a new pinecone and paint color to create a unique pinecone painting.

Nature Journal: Have your child brush-draw a lion.
